When you consider great people in the Bible, who do you think of? Obviously you would first pick Jesus, He's the perfect choice. Perhaps you think of one of the Old Testament Patriarchs, Abraham or Joseph. For many, our minds would quickly choose one of the great characters of the New Testament. However, unless you are fairly well-versed in the Scriptures, you probably wouldn't include King Hezekiah in your 'Top 10 List.' What do you know about Hezekiah? You may not be aware that the Bible says, "Hezekiah trusted in the Lord God of Israel; not one of the kings of Judah was like him, either before him or after him." (2 Kings 18:5) What if our lives were described like that? We live in a generation that needs people who do just that, trust God. How would those closest to you describe your life? Are you honest? How would life be different if we did? Over the next 10 weeks we will take a much closer look at the life of this man whose life made a difference. WEEK ONE - DAY ONE

OBSERVATION

Read 2 Kings 16:1-4, 20

The journey begins today into the life of Hezekiah. The name Hezekiah in Hebrew means "God has strengthened." This is appropriate, given the story of this uncommon king's life and reign. As we will see, he emerges from the most unlikely background to rule with persistent godliness.

Who was the father of Ahaz?

INVESTIGATE

What Kingdom did Ahaz rule over?

How old was he when he became king?

What new standards for sinning does Ahaz set?
Compare verses 3-4 with Exodus 13:1-13.

What happened to Ahaz?

PONDER: What would cause God to allow those who are walking against His will to rule?

Is your answer based on scripture or emotion?

Read 2 Chronicles 28:1-4

Hezekiah becomes the thirteenth king of Judah since the northern and southern lands of Israel are divided. The reign of Hezekiah begins with a father of unparalleled wickedness.

WHAT

What is the chronicler's assessment of Ahaz?

What horrible practice did he institute?

Where did Ahaz practice these horrible acts?

THINK: We often have multiple examples in our lives and we can choose which one we decide to follow. You read that Ahaz chose not to follow his forefather David. What causes us to choose a path that is less than what God wants for us?

Read 2 Chronicles 28:24-27

WHAT

What does Ahaz do to the temple?

What does Ahaz build?

Where did Ahaz build his buildings?

Ahaz purposefully attempts to anger God. The "High places" were altars built on cliffs and mountains that were considered sacred space due to their usage for various forms of worship, including incense and sometimes sacrifice. These high places were often dedicated to the worship of God, but apparently not in Ahaz's lifetime.

REFLECT: How often do you consider your legacy? King Ahaz definitely left one. Take a few minutes and write out what yours might sound like.

WEEK ONE - DAY FOUR

INTERPRETATION

Read 2 Chronicles 28:1-4, 24-27

Ahaz sees to it that this pagan worship takes place all over the city of Jerusalem, and then moves outward with his campaign of sorcery.

How would you describe the obstacles Ahaz has put in the way of worshipping God?

What do you think was the hardest part for the true believers during Ahaz's reign?

What does 2 Chronicles 28:27 say to you about Ahaz's life?

WHAT

THINK: How do we remain proactive in being faithful in today's culture of decaying moral and spiritual values?

WEEK ONE - DAY FIVE

APPLICATION

Read: Review the passages from this week.

In your past, what trouble has driven you away from the Lord?

In your past, what trouble has driven you *toward* the Lord?

THINK: From the time of Moses to Hezekiah the snake pole of Moses had gone from being a sign of God's discipline and forgiveness to an object of infatuation for the people. The symbolic reminder of repentance had now become an object of worship. The *created* was worshipped and not the *creator*. Does this happen today?

WEEK TWO - DAY FIVE

APPLICATION

Read 2 Kings 18:1-4, 2 Chronicles 29:1-3

On any remodel site, no one stops after the demolition. Most times the demolition process is the easiest part of a remodel. Spiritually, it is the same way. WEEK FIVE - DAY FOUR

INTERPRETATION

Read 2 Chronicles 30:1-12

What was the sin they were warned against in verse 7?

What was the sin they were warned against in verse 8?

What was the promised reward if they would return to the Lord in verse 9?

Israel had been sent into captivity and carried away into slavery because they were unfaithful. Not only did they follow after other gods, but they were not faithful to observe the Passover. They failed to follow after God and obey His commands because they failed to love Him. Their stubbornness kept them from returning to the God that called them to return to himself.

Hezekiah had a desire to serve God. He wanted the people to once again focus their devotion on God. So he invited all of Israel, all of Judah, every descendant of Abraham from the far northern border of Dan to the extreme southern border of Beersheba. The response was dismal. A small number responded: One tribe (Judah) and a small percentage from Asher, Manasseh and Zebulun.

Read 2 Chronicles 30:1-12

The King and his officials/princes were ready to return to Yahweh, but only a small number of the Israelites were willing to humble themselves, repent and follow God's ways.

We must never allow the failures of others to deter us from following Christ. When God's people are a minority, we must follow on. Our obedience cannot be hindered or deterred by the failures of those around us.

-
- Even though the decree came from the king and his court; there was a poor response.
 - Even though there was a warning to avoid the sins of unfaithfulness and stubbornness; the people were unfaithful and stubborn.
 - Even though there was a promise of freedom for their families; the people would not follow after God.

PONDER: Humanity cannot legislate godliness and laws or decrees cannot bring about repentance. Bribes and promises cannot soften the hearts of sinners.

So what should we do?

WEEK SIX - DAY ONE

OBSERVATION

Read 2 Chronicles 30:16-18

WHO

Write down the persons or groups who are listed in this passage, along with their roles/responsibilities (Ex: Priests – sprinkled blood they had received from the Levites)

Context: In earlier times, the head of each family would have killed his own lamb for the sacrifice. Since many had not consecrated themselves, the Levites filled that role on their behalf. This was a deviation from the instructions of the Law. Hezekiah interceded on their behalf. This passage points to Christ's own actions in sacrificing Himself for us.

THINK: What would your life be like now, if not for Christ's sacrifice? Who interceded in prayer for you before you met Christ?

Read 2 Chronicles 30:19-21

WHAT

The Israelites sacrificed in a way that was not acceptable to the Law. What happened when Hezekiah interceded with God on their behalf (verse 20)?




